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

## Activities in the project


- Review of practices of Higher Education engagement in citizen enhanced open science in the area of cultural heritage

## Citizen Science: setting the standards

- Public participation in scientific research:
- "actively involve the public directly in the multifaceted and iterative processes of scientific investigation. Such efforts includé citizen science, volunteer monitoring, and participatory action research. Projects that fall into these categories allow participants to **learn both science** content and process while experiencing the fun and excitement of research." (Bonney, et al., 2009, p. 10).

The eight ambitions of open science.

#### **OPEN DATA**

FAIR (Findable, Accessible. Interoperable and Re-usable data) and open data sharing should become the default option for the results of EU-funded scientific research.

#### REWARDS

Research career evaluation systems should fully acknowledge open science activities.

#### **EUROPEAN OPEN SCIENCE CLOUD**

A "federated ecosystem of research data infrastructures" will allow the scientific community to share and process publicly funded research results and data across borders and scientific domains.

#### RESEARCH INTEGRITY

All publicly funded research in the EU should adhere to commonly agreed standards of research integrity.

#### **NEW GENERATION**

**OPEN SCIENCE** 

be developed to complement the conventional indicators for research quality and impact, so as to do practices.






## Collaboration with the Cultural Heritage sector

- Respect privacy and authorship
- Provide an ethics and deontology framework
- Manage discord, conflict and divergent opinion

### Some examples...

- Development of **user requirements** & **guidelines** for CHIs involved in Citizen Science initiatives.
- ➤ Self-assessment questionnaire for CHIs
  - > Focus on three stages of the CS initiative (before, during, after)
  - > Evaluation of the initiative impact
  - > Stress on copyright/ethical/legal challenges
- ➤ Provide CHIs with valuable feedback on how to **enhance** their citizen science initiative






## Citizen Science Methodologies for CHIs?


